RE: Approval of 2020/2021 2nd Interim Budget Report

We would like to thank you for your timely submission of the 2020/2021 2nd Interim report. Our office has completed its review in compliance with the provisions of Education Code 42131(a) (2). The Code requires the County Superintendent to approve or disapprove Interim Reports after:

Examining the report to determine whether it complies with the standards and criteria established pursuant to Section 33127.

Determining whether the adopted budget will allow the district to meet its financial obligations during the fiscal year and is consistent with a financial plan that will enable the district to satisfy its multi-year financial commitments.

Based on our review, the 2nd Interim Budget Report has been approved.

Additional changes, including attendance, new state programs, and the Governor's proposed 2021/2022 budget will be addressed as more solid information becomes available. A complete listing of any technical corrections and recommendations has been sent directly to the chief business official.

Multi-Year Projections

Governor Newsom's 2021/2022 budget proposal provides for a strong recovery in educational funding by taking steps to eliminate on going deferrals and proposing not only to fund the new year COLA but inflates it by the current year COLA as well. The budget also recognizes the academic challenges of COVID-19 and directs funds to LEAs, although mostly restricted, to help address those challenges. While we hope this upward trend in state revenues continues, we continue to remind you that each LEA faces its own particular set of financial risk factors based on current reserve levels, enrollment trends, bargaining agreements, degree of revenue volatility and various other local and statewide factors. It is important that districts continue to assess their individual situations and plan accordingly to maintain fiscal solvency.

Cash Flow

Due to the 2020/2021 adopted state budget implementing cash deferrals beginning February 2021, cash monitoring is now more critical than ever. Currently the District is anticipating a positive cash balance on June 30; however, we request the District to

continue to update its cash flow monthly and if needed be prepared to implement one of the cash flow options at its disposal, whether that is temporary inter-fund borrowing, a loan from the County Office of Education, a loan from the County Treasurer or a Tax Revenue Anticipation Note (TRAN).

Deficit Spending

The district's budget reflects deficit spending in years two and three of the unrestricted multi-year projection as follows; (\$75,994) and (\$97,083). Years two and three also include the current COLA proposal and may be impacted by a possible reduction.. We encourage the District to review the impact of a COLA decrease and have a contingency plan in place to mitigate the possible reduction of the LCFF revenue.

The attached trend analysis of the 2nd interim budget to prior year actuals is provided for your assistance and will provide you with important comparative data for budgetary consideration. The comparative data will highlight trends in revenue and expenditure growth or decline, deficit spending patterns, and a final accounting for the ending fund balance.

We would like to express our gratitude to you and your staff for your cooperation and assistance during our financial reviews. If our office can be of further assistance, please contact Debbie Towne at 530-528-7351.

Although the revisions must be made known at a public meeting, the only public hearing requirement is for the initial budget and the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP).

Pursuant to Ed. Codes 42103, 42127 and 52062, each school district's governing board shall hold a public hearing on the proposed budget and the LCAP during which any member of the public may appear and be heard. The public hearing shall be held **not less than three working days** following the availability of the proposed budget and LCAP for public inspection. The County Superintendent of Schools shall publish the date and location at which the proposed budget and LCAP may be inspected by the public as well as the date, time, and location of the public hearing of the proposed budget and LCAP. One legal notice will appear in the Red Bluff Daily News or the Corning Observer.

Budget/LCAP Hearing Planning Form

LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN (LCAP) Hearing

Pursuant to Education Code Section 52062(b)(1), governing boards must hold at least one public hearing to solicit the recommendations and comments from members of the public regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP. This public hearing shall be held at the same meeting as the public hearing required by Education Code Section 42127(a)(1) - the budget hearing.

Note: The governing board shall adopt the LCAP in a public meeting. This meeting must be held after, but not on the same day as, the public hearing mentioned above. Also note, the LCAP must be adopted at the same meeting the governing board adopts the budget.

BUDGET HEARING

NOTE: THE DISTRICT MUST HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED BUDGET THEN, AT A SEPARATE PUBLIC MEETING, ON A DIFFERENT DATE, ADOPT THE PROPOSED BUDGET BY JULY 1

Education Code Section 42103 requires the County Superintendent of Schools to publish the notices of public hearing on the proposed budget for each school district. These notices must contain the date, time and place of the public hearing. One legal notice will appear in the Red Bluff Daily News or the Corning Observer, as required by this code section in the period between 45 days and 10 days before the hearing. In the event a district changes its meeting date, or is required to run a second notice for LCAP approval, it will be the responsibility of the district to advertise the notice at its own expense.







Conduct

BP 5131

Students

The Governing Board believes that all students have the right to be educated in a safe and positive learning environment free from disruptions. Students shall be expected to exhibit appropriate conduct that does not infringe upon the rights of others or interfere with the school program while on school grounds, going to or coming from school, at school activities, or using district transportation.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school develops standards of conduct and discipline consistent with Board policies and administrative regulations. Students and parents/guardians shall be notified of district and school rules related to conduct.

Prohibited student conduct includes, but is not limited to:

1. Conduct that endangers students, staff, or others, including, but not limited to, physical violence, possession of a firearm or other weapon, and terrorist threats

(cf. 5131.7 - Weapons and Dangerous Instruments) (cf. 5142 - Safety)

Discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students or staff, including sexual harassment, hate-motivated behavior, cyberbullying, hazing or initiation activity, extortion, or any other verbal, written, or physical conduct that causes or threatens to cause violence, bodily harm, or substantial disruption to the school program

3. Conduct that disrupts the orderly classroom or school environment

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Note: Penal Code 417.27 prohibits students from possessing laser pointers on school premises, unless the pointer is used for valid instructional or other school-related purpose, as provided in item #8 below. Penal Code 417.25 states that aiming or pointing a laser scope (i.e., a portable device capable of projecting a laser light on objects at a distance) at another person in a threatening manner, whether or not the laser scope is attached to a firearm, may be a misdemeanor if intended to cause a person fear of bodily harm.

8. Possession or use of a laser pointer, unless for a valid instructional or other school-related purpose with prior permission of the principal or designee (Penal Code 417.27)

Note: Additionally, Education Code 48901.7, as added by AB 272 (Ch. 42, Statutes of 2019), authorizes the Governing Board to limit or prohibit student use of smartphones while at school or while under the supervision and control of an employee of the district, except under specified circumstances. See BP 5131.8 - Mobile Communication Devices.

9. Use of a cell phone, smart watch, pager, or other mobile communication device during instructional time or in an unauthorized manner in violation of district policy

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Employees are expected to enforce standards of conduct and, when they observe or receive a report of a violation of these standards, to appropriately intervene or seek assistance. As necessary, the employee shall refer the matter to a supervisor or the principal or designee.

student misconduct, the legality of the search will depend on whether the search is "reasonable" (New Jersey v. T.L.O); see BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure. The "reasonableness" of a search depends on (1) whether there is individualized suspicion that the search will turn up evidence of a student's violation of the law or school rules and (2) whether the search is reasonably related to the objectives of the search and not excessively intrusive in light of the student's age, gender, and/or the nature of the infraction. It is recommended that the district consult with legal counsel as appropriate.***

When a school employee suspects that a search of a student or a student's belongings will turn up evidence of the student's violation of the law or school rules, such a search shall be conducted in accordance with BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure.

When a student uses any prohibited device, or uses a permitted device in an unauthorized manner, a district employee may confiscate the device. The employee shall store the device securely until it is returned to the student or turned over to the principal or designee, as appropriate.

Students who violate district or school rules and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, referral to a student success team or counseling services, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities or other privileges in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

Students also may be subject to discipline, in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation, for any off-campus conduct during nonschool hours which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or district property, or substantially disrupts school activities.
